LAWSUIT DISMISSED

On February Second at a hearing in Lansing the court dismissed our "health care as a right" lawsuit. The Judge ruled that the language of the state Constitution and the statute that we relied on was too vague for her to find there was a right to health care. MichUHCAN has authorized an appeal. We expect to get a reversal but there will be no ruling for at least six to eight months.

MediCAID Fight and Press Conference

On March 17th MichUHCAN President Marjorie Mitchell addressed the press in a press conference organized by SEIU. Gov. Granholm could not attend due to illness but Sharon Geier appeared on her behalf.

The Governor, Director Geier, speakers for the AARP, the AFL-CIO (Pres. Mark Gaffney), Michigan League for Human Services, and other health advocacy groups all said there should be NO Medicaid cuts! Medicaid covers hundreds of thousands of children and one seventh of Michigan's population.

Mitchell, President of MichUHCAN put it in context. "We must win these defensive fights. We at MichUHCAN join in saying 'do not cut Medicaid!' But we have this fight every year, and what we really need is universal coverage!"

We won part of the Medicaid fight in Washington D. C. on March 17th when the Senate voted 52-48 for NO cuts in Medicaid. Seven Republican joined the 44 Democrats and one independent to defeat the Medicaid cuts. Both Senators Levin and Stabenow voted OUR way. Call them and thank them for their help. But the House, in a close vote (218-214) voted to cut Medicaid. Nine of Michigan's 15 Representatives voted for the cuts. Six Michigan Representatives did the right thing. Call and thank them!

BULK DRUG BUYING

On September 26, 2004 the Governor appeared at the MOSES public meeting and announced her MiRX program as buying drugs in bulk for the uninsured and underinsured. On Friday, February 25, 2005 the chair of the MOSES health committee, Fr. Joseph Gagnon, and Gary Benjamin, visited the Medicaid office in Lansing to inquire about how this system was working. The government is not actually buying drugs in bulk as was called for by the legislation MichUHCAN supported last year.

However, the MiRX card is a free card provided by the State to anyone whose income is below 300% of poverty. The only eligibility requirements are that you have no other prescription coverage (so if you have health insurance but no prescription coverage you are eligible); be a resident of Michigan; apply; and have income as follows:

The income levels are more generous then past cards and the card carries discounts at participating pharmacies of 5% to 25%. There are no category requirements such as age or disability. For more information call toll free 1-866-755-6479 or go to www.michigan.gov/mdch and look for the MiRX application to download.

The state gets a report back from the pharmacies as to how many prescriptions for each company have been filled and reports that to the drug companies. The companies send the state rebate checks which help fund the Medicaid program.

UNION OF UNINSURED AND UNDERINSURED

The UUU is holding its first forum. The topic will be the Health Care Authority and the prospect for universal health care access or coverage in the City of Detroit. The meeting will be on Tuesday, May 24, 2005 at 6:30 PM at the First Unitarian Church at 4605 Cass Avenue (corner of

Cass and Forest) in Detroit. Invited to participate on the panel are Chris Allen, newly hired Executive Director of the Detroit Wayne County Health Authority (DWCHA); Council President Pro Tem Ken Cockrel; a representative of Physicians for a National Health Plan; and County Health Director Anahid Kulwiki has confirmed as a panel member. Cockrel was instrumental in getting the Detroit City Council's endorsement of the Health Care Finance Commission Resolution.

The DWCHA has as its goal health care for all of the residents of Wayne County, including Detroiters. See their website at www.dwcha.org. The UUU has a website at www.UUUDetroit.org.

The Authority has had several meetings and organized two advisory boards. MichUHCAN members Selma Goode and Gary Benjamin are on the community advisory board and MichUHCAN members Jewel Ware, Chair of the Wayne County Commission, and Mary Ann Mahaffey, President of the City Council have been appointed as members of the nine member Authority Board.

Michigan Health Care Resolution Status Report

As of mid-March, 24 local governments and organizations have endorsed the Resolution. Our goal is to obtain at least 50 Endorsements by the end of 2005 and then request that Governor Granholm establish a commission to study the financing of health care in Michigan in order to make it more efficient, equitable, and all-inclusive of Michigan citizens.

The Resolution endorsements include Detroit, Sanilac County, and Bishop Wendell Gibbs and Dean Stephen Bancroft of the Episcopal Archdiocese of Michigan.
